## THE BLOCK ISLAND CLUB (Part 1 of 2)

It was one of those not-so-great Block Island days in late August or early September of 1963 when two men came together to look at a piece of land for sale by Dorothy Sullivan. "Bud" Pomeroy and Dr. Edgar Frazelle were in search of some land on which to establish a boat and tennis club, not even sure at that point if anyone would be willing to join. The property included approximately ten acres of land and two homes, at a

cost of \$30,000 which they considered a horrendous price. During the following weeks, Dr. DuPont Guerry became the third investor.

The three men agreed to purchase the property where the current clubhouse stands. Dr. Guerry and "Bud" Pomeroy then left for a trip around the world, and while in Hong Kong were notified by Dr. Frazelle that the property deal was complete. This was a turbulent time, about the time of the John F. Kennedy assassination.

After the two houses on the property were sold, the new owners were in search of people to join the Club, charging \$130 for a membership. Stephen duPont became the first president and many people joined the Club. As the three Club founders were in search of a clubhouse, a Victorian-style lifesaving station

was sitting in town near Old Harbor, and the three Club founders were willing to buy it and have it moved to the Club property. Mystic Seaport had a different idea and wanted it taken to the museum in Mystic, so Mystic Seaport offered to build a replica of the old lifesaving station in exchange for the old building.

The replica stands on the property today, and the first staff, a couple, moved in by the summer of 1965. Over the years, some of the staff have lived in the ship-like, attic quarters. After all those years, today you will still find sailboats heading out for lessons or races, the sound of a tennis ball on the tennis courts, the splash of swimming lessons, and the arts and crafts studio creating new, young artists. Along with all these activities, you will still find the tranquil, young toddlers hunting for crabs in hopes of winning the crab races.

The Block Island Club has weathered change on Block Island as well as change throughout the world, but one thing you can say about the Block Island Club, it stays about the same and stays true to its original intent to bring Block Islanders, summer residents, and vacationers together.
